7. Course objectives (derived from the specific competences acquired)

7.1 General objective of course	 Understanding how space (territory) influences the strategic behaviour of state and non-state actors and their competition for resources, how politics has been and is informed by geography by those who define themselves using the appellation of geopoliticians. The course critically analyses the use and abuse of geopolitical terminology to justify and/or hide power relations between nations, but also between other supranational, international or transnational entities. Both the alleged objective perspectives and the social representations of the political-geographic spaces and the human communities that populate them are analysed.
7.2 Specific objectives	- the presentation of relevant schools of political geography, geopolitics and geostrategy; - the formation of the skills necessary for the geopolitician: the development of the mental map, in accordance with the realities of political and human geography; the ability to understand the power games that characterize world politics; knowledge of structural, formal, practical and popular geopolitics; understanding the relationships between geopolitics, geostrategy and geoeconomics; - Geopolitical analysis of regions of interest (regional geopolitics); - Students' understanding of developments in the contemporary international security environment from a geopolitical perspective; - the development of a geopolitical research method, applied to national and regional case studies.
