7.1 The general objective of the course	• The discipline has as general objective the analysis of the concepts and methods of philosophical aesthetics and the extension of its field of application to areas neglected so far, such as everyday life. This goal is motivated by explorations in recently developed areas, such as "everyday aesthetics" and "organizational aesthetics", this course seeking to explore new applications for an aesthetics of everyday life. However, the course does not set aside art as an area of interest, but will systematically examine the concepts of "art", "aesthetic", "aesthetic experience" and the corresponding practices in the art world and in everyday life. This theoretical substantiation will allow a deeper investigation of the applications of aesthetics in a wide range of areas of activity, such as aesthetic social situations, aesthetic techniques of self-creation, as well as daily life in organizations.
