**Laurel Brake** is professor emerita of literature and print culture, Birkbeck, University of London.

Fiona Ross is director of the National Library of Ireland.

Elizabeth Tilley teaches 19th century literature and book history at NUIG and is an associate editor of the "Dictionary of Nineteenth Century Journalism".

Chloe Kroeter is a doctoral candidate at King's College, Cambridge. Her dissertation examines art production in the periodical illustrations produced by early 20th century British political movements.

Oliver O'Hanlon is a PhD student in the department of French, UCC. He is studying the links between France and Ireland through the work of French journalists who wrote about Ireland in the the 20th century.

Patrick Maume has taught 19th and 20th-century Irish history at UCD and QUB. He is a researcher with the Royal Irish Academy's ongoing

"Dictionary of Irish Biography", and has published numerous books. **Kim Gallon** is assistant professor of history and director of the Africana Studies program at Muhlenberg College in Allentown, Pennsylvania. She is currently working on a manuscript titled, "Covering the Race in Black and White: Sexuality and Modern Black Newspapers, 1925-1945".

**Teresa Jo Styles** is a professor of journalism and mass communications at North Carolina A & T State University. **Lauren Arrington** is a lecturer at the University of Liverpool and has published widely on the relationship between literature and politics in the long 19th and 20th centuries.


James Curry is completing a PhD at NUIG on the impact of the press during the Dublin Lockout of 1913-14.
